Accessible Instructional Materials (AIM)

Textbooks are the most frequently used piece of the curriculum and one of the most important elements of a student's education. Other types of AIM exist, but Learning Ally focuses on curricular

text and literature.

Other types of AIM include:

- Braille
- Large Print
- Human voice digital audio
- Text to Speech
- E-Text






